This book dances on the line between reality and fantasy as it takes the reader through the magic behind childhood games and dreams. This novel maintains a light-hearted mood even during its bewitching or sad moments. I definitely recommend it to readers looking for a bit of allurement and fantasy in their "grown-up" lives.
